TOM ANDERSON



Tom Anderson was born in Pine Bluff, AR, but raised in Little Rock. He attended Joe T. Robinson High School and played football, basketball and baseball. He was valedictorian of his high school class. After graduating from UCA with a degree in accounting he went to work for Peat, Marwick, Mitchell, CPA in Little Rock. After two years he joined IBM and spent 20 years in sales and management. When IBM spun off their typewriter division, he helped start Lexmark where he worked thirteen years. He worked for a short time at Acxiom before joining Dell where he retired in 2014 after 10 years in account management. He has a BBA and MBA from UCA.

Tom had a dual career, being a member of the US Army National Guard and Army Reserve. He retired in 2000 as a Colonel after a 32-year career. He is in the Arkansas Military Academy Hall of Fame, the Chemical Corps Hall of Fame and is an Army Reserve Ambassador Emeritus. During his service he commanded a battalion on Desert Storm, commanded at the Brigade level and was chief of staff at the 90th Regional Support Command. He is a 1994 graduate of the Army War College.

Tom has volunteered in many organizations including Little Rock Jaycees, Reserve Officers Association, Ducks Unlimited, AUSA, Our Community Salutes, Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, and is current Chair of the AR Workforce Development Board. He currently works for Wellons Real Estate and Land Company and sells farms, duck clubs and recreational land.

Tom lives in Roland with his wife Candy. They have two children and seven grandchildren. His wife is a former teacher at Pulaski Academy.

Command Spotlight

MAJOR STACIE RHOADS

Everyone has a "why" that tells the story of his or her life's path. That question of "why" was vital in my choice to become a State Trooper. Being a cop was not on the road map I charted for myself. I felt destined for another place. As a young girl growing up in rural Arkansas during the early 80s, law enforcement just wasn't something women were supposed to do. Most females I knew were drawn to nursing, business, or teaching. Out of high school, I attended Arkansas Tech University and studied Graphic Design. It wasn't until after college that I hit a speed bump that completely redirected my life's plan.



In the mid-'90s, after college, I moved to Little Rock and worked as a customer service manager for a local grocery. Not a flashy or lucrative position, but it paid the bills. Little Rock was experiencing an increase in violent crime that was so historic that HBO memorialized the chaos in the documentary Banging in the Rock. During the early morning hours of a routine shift, I was robbed at gunpoint by two masked gunmen. The police department was unsuccessful in finding those responsible, and because of so many unanswered questions, I was unable to put the ordeal behind me. An overwhelming feeling of victimization consumed me, and I wondered how many people are victimized and never find the answers they need to move forward. It was here that I discovered my first taste of "why."

Playing off stereotypes from my childhood, I honestly didn't know if I could be a cop or perform as a law enforcement officer. Could I arrest a 270-pound drunk man in overalls at 2 am on the side of the road? Was I capable? Determined to find out, I enlisted in the United States Marine Corps. Becoming a US Marine helped me prove to myself that I was capable of being whoever I wanted to be, and this "road less traveled by" made all the difference.

After serving six years as a Marine, I applied with the Arkansas State Police. In 1998, I was hired and worked my way through the ranks, first in Highway Patrol and then Criminal Investigations. In 2022, I was promoted to Major in the division, which has given me more purpose than any other career I could have chosen.

Through it all, I learned a lot about the world and the people in it. I've seen the purest of hearts and the ugliest of souls. I've seen the evil one human can commit on another, but I've also seen the resiliency of the human spirit. I've seen the beauty of determination, grit, and forgiveness. I've seen children stand braver than adults. I've witnessed the wrongly accused be vindicated. I've witnessed broken victims find the courage to address attackers in court with poise and dignity. I've seen the agony of grief and the gut-wrenching expressions of loss. I've been heartbroken and disappointed. I've been praised and applauded. I've been criticized and dismissed. I've been overjoyed and exhilarated. I've been wrong, and I've been right. And, after all this time, the journey has been my reward, not my final destination.

In 2015, I was appointed by Governor Asa Hutchinson to the Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Training. In 2016, I graduated from the 266 Session of the FBI National Academy.

The Arkansas State Police gave me a true purpose and introduced me to my husband, Major Roby Rhoads, whom I met while assigned to Troop A in Pulaski County. We often laugh that our dating life revolved around the number of criminal arrests we made. We have two sons and live in Little Italy.

Wherever life finds you, regardless of the obstacles or difficulties you face, knowing your "why" will keep you moving in the right direction. Know what you're capable of and stretch the limits of your abilities. Whatever you do, know "why" you do it, and this highway of life will be the best road trip you've ever taken. Page | 3

Retiree Spotlight

CRANDALL DWIGHT TOSH



Retired ASP Captain Dwight Tosh started his career as a Radio Operator for District 8, which a couple of years later became Troop C, on August 15, 1968 at the age of nineteen. He has been married to Joan Darr Tosh for 53 years and has two children and four grandchildren. Their daughter, Christy Tosh Crider, is an attorney at Law in Nashville, Tennessee and their son, Brant Tosh, is a Lieutenant with Arkansas State Police in CID.

On October 1, 1971, at the age of twenty-two, Dwight was commissioned as a trooper and assigned to Monticello in Drew County. In 1972, he was transferred in Highway Patrol to Troop C, Harrisburg in Poinsett County. In September of 1974, Dwight was transferred within Troop C to Jonesboro where he served as Public Information Officer for six years.

In May of 1980, he was promoted to Sergeant Troop D, in Forrest City where he was Post Sergeant for St. Francis, Lee and Phillips Counties. December 17, 1985, Dwight was promoted to Lieutenant, Assistant Troop Commander, Troop D, Forrest City. Twenty-two months later, in October of 1987 at the age of thirty-eight, he was appointed troop Commander of Troop B in Newport where he stayed until he retired January 1, 2005.

During his career, Dwight supervised the first three-manned Criminal Apprehension Patrol (CAP) team in Troop D, I 40, where they made numerous drug arrests and drug seizures. He also served as SWAT Team leader in Troop D and was one of the first police officers trained by the FBI Hostage Negotiation Team. As a Hostage Negotiator, he was also awarded two Official Commendations.

Tosh is a graduate of Valley View High School and attended Arkansas State University. He also received specialized training at Southwest Texas State University, University of Louisville in Kentucky, Central Missouri State University and Northwestern University in Evanston Illinois.

In 2014 he was elected to the Arkansas General Assembly as a State Representative. In his second term, he served as vice-chairman of the Judiciary Committee. Dwight was appointed by the Speaker of the House as chairman of State Agencies and Governmental Affairs in his third term and was reappointed to that position his fourth and fifth term. He is currently serving his fifth term where he also serves on Rules, Joint Budget and various other committees. Tosh has been honored to be the keynote speaker at four Law Enforcement graduating classes.

As a State Representative, Tosh has always been a strong advocate for Law Enforcement. A priority of his has been to sponsor Bills that help make Law Enforcement officers jobs easier. Representative Tosh states that it's just as important to stop legislation that makes their jobs more difficult.

Representative Tosh is extremely proud that during his tenure as a representative, the Arkansas State Police received the largest pay raise in the history of the ASP. He was glad to support the Bill.
